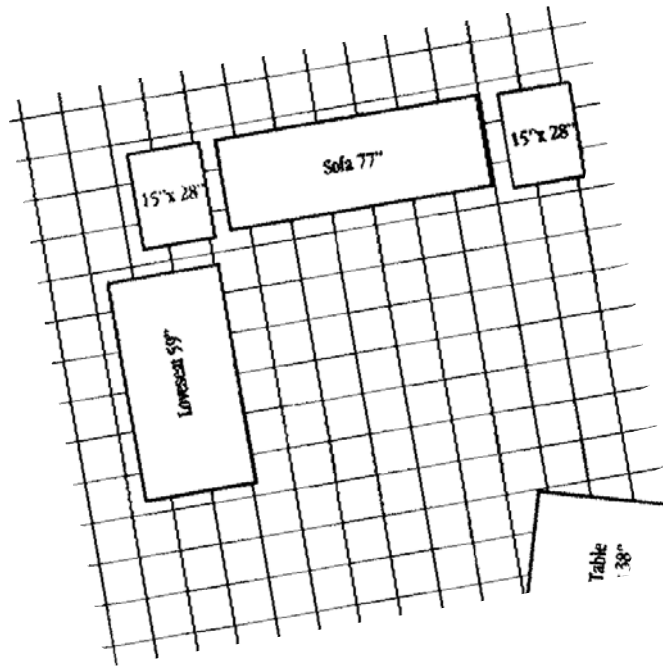

Step 1: ANSWER THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS

- What are the primary functions of the room (i.e., reading, watching T.V., eating, entertaining, etc.)?

- Will the room have heavy, medium, or light use? (Circle one)

- Who will use the room?

- What items will remain in the room after redecorating?

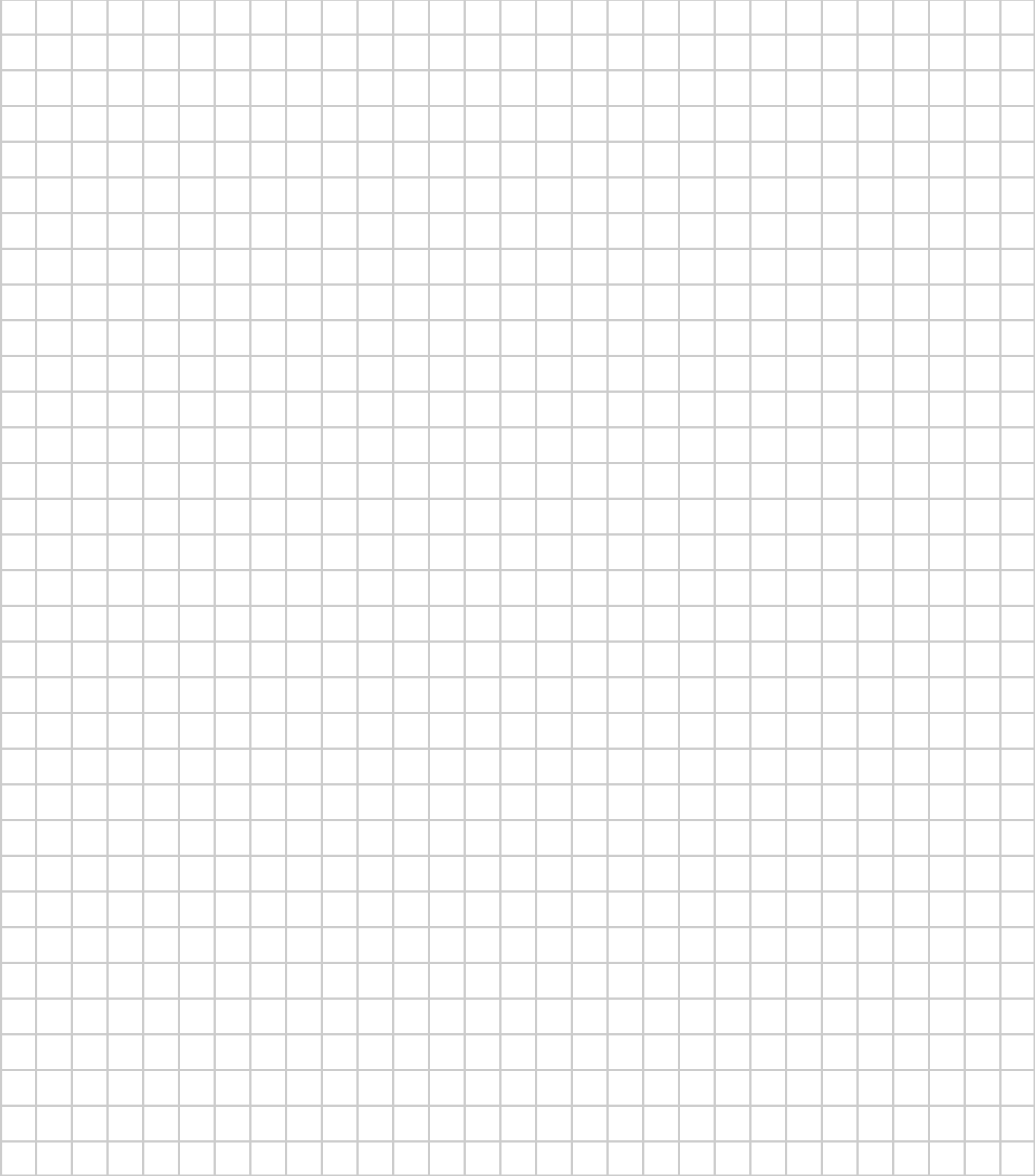
- What is the type and color of the window treatments?

- What is the type and color of the carpet or floor covering?

- What rooms are adjacent to this room? Give a brief description of each.

Step 2: DRAW YOUR ROOM TO SCALE

Use a tape measure to measure all of the dimensions of your room, then draw it out on the graph paper below using a pencil. (The paper is 1/4" scale. One square equals one foot.) Leave spaces for doors, windows, and other openings. Designate utility outlets with a small circle. Place an "E" in the circle for an electrical outlet, "C" for cable T.V., and "T" for telephone. Hint: It is easier to take over-all width and length measurements of the room first, and draw that out. Then go back and take specific measurements from wall to window frame, between window frames, and so on.

Step 3: ARRANGE YOUR ROOM

Choosing from the template provided, cut out the ones that come closest in size and shape to your furniture pieces. The width and depth of each is indicated on the template. Unless your space is very limited, don't worry if the template differs by only 2 or 3 inches. Do this for existing pieces that you already own and for pieces that you will purchase in the future.

Here are some important things to consider:

Traffic flow. Notice the paths people take into and out of a room, and position furniture so it won't block the normal flow. Allow about a 2-foot width (2 squares) for a traffic path.

Focal point. Find an important element—a fireplace, window or a large furniture piece—to revolve your furniture arrangement around.

Balance. Check to make sure all the heavy pieces are not all in one end of the room. Space pattern and color around the room, too.

Conversation areas. Be sure chairs are not more than 8 feet apart for comfortable conversation, and place them so they face each other.

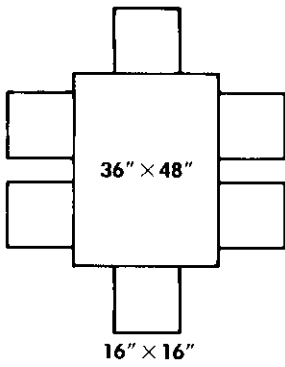
Have fun! Use the planner to rearrange the furniture in ways you never thought of before. It is a lot easier to move the templates around than it is to move the real thing. You can even make copies of the floor plan so you can use it for multiple room or settings.

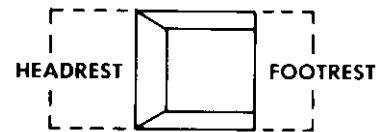

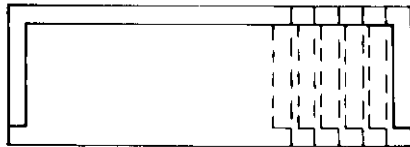

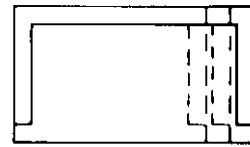
